I find that being a wife these days has taken on a different perspective that doesn't fit the scripture. Being a contemporary woman, I have lived the life thinking I can have it all. However, when the Lord let me know it was time to retire from full time pastorate and dedicate my time to my son, then my life took on a different twist. In addition, it also meant spending time at home caring for my husband who works a tough job with a lot of demands on him. This was all very new to me. I realized that I was not really prepared for the sacrifice this would require.



While reading a book titled, "Seeing through the Lies" by Vonda Skelton, I had to face some serious character flaws which were hindering me from being successful in the role God had placed me. The book details that when Abraham's servant went to get Isaac a wife, he did not pray to Abraham's God and ask that she be beautiful, talented, have a degree, etc. Genesis 24:14 states his prayer request as follows: "And let it so be that the girl to whom I say, 'I pray you, let down your jar that I may drink, and she replies, Drink, and
